

Allowed Baggage:

Cabin baggage is not permitted onboard, as our aircraft do not have suitable storage space for it. Hand baggage will be handed over to ground operations personnel responsible for the flight, who will place it in the cargo hold. The maximum allowed weight for baggage originally intended for the cabin is 10 kilograms (22 lbs).

- Passenger Baggage Regulations

Airlines establish rules regarding the amount of baggage that may be checked and any applicable charges. These policies may vary depending on frequent flyer status, ticket class, and flight route.

- Carry-On Baggage

Quantity, Weight, and Dimensions

Personal Items:

This may include a handbag, backpack, diaper bag, laptop bag, or small package.



Carry-On and/or Checked Baggage

Carry-on baggage allowances vary depending on the airline, cabin class, and aircraft size. As a general guideline, carry-on baggage should not exceed: Length: 56 cm (22 inches), Width: 45 cm (18 inches), Depth: 25 cm (10 inches) These measurements include wheels, handles, side pockets, etc.



Maximum weight: 5 kg (11 lbs)

Carry-On and Checked Baggage Restrictions

Restricted items in baggage include substances or objects that pose a risk to health, safety, the environment, or aircraft operations. These items are not allowed in any type of baggage.

Portable Electronic Devices and Lithium Batteries	Lithium batteries in portable electronic devices can pose a fire risk if not handled and packed correctly. If you are traveling with spare batteries, electronic cigarettes/vapes, external batteries (power banks), or most other portable electronic devices, these must be carried in your hand luggage, not in checked baggage. Spare batteries must be individually protected to prevent short circuits.
Sharp Objects	All knives, sharp items, or cutting instruments of any type and length—whether made of metal or other materials—as well as certain types of

	<p>sports equipment, must be packed in checked baggage. These items are not allowed in carry-on luggage or on your person.</p>
Liquids, Aerosols, Gels, and Powders	<p>Security regulations limit the amount of liquids, aerosols, and gels that may be carried in hand baggage.</p> <p>The International Civil Aviation Organization, UN's aviation regulatory body, has established guidelines that are increasingly being adopted by governments worldwide. According to OACI regulations, current in most countries, require that these substances must be contained in individual containers no larger than 100 ml or equivalent. Placed in a single resealable transparent plastic bag with a maximum capacity of 1 liter.</p> <p>At security screening points, these bags must be presented separately from other carry-on items.</p> <p>Medications, baby milk or food, and special dietary items are exempt from these restrictions.</p> <p>Some airports may also require additional screening for powders in quantities over 355 ml (12 ounces).</p>
Medical Supplies	<p>If you need to use medical syringes during the flight (e.g., for insulin), you must carry documented proof of medical need and ensure that the items are properly packed and labeled.</p> <p>Failure to do so may result in the medication being confiscated during the security screening process.</p>

Storing Your Carry-On Baggage

For safety reasons, all cabin baggage must be stored as soon as possible after boarding the aircraft.

Baggage may be stored under the seat in front of you. Similar restrictions apply to seats in emergency exit rows.

If no storage space is available onboard, or if your bag must be removed at the boarding gate, ground staff will place it in the aircraft's cargo hold. Before handing over your bag, please remove all portable electronic devices, spare batteries, and any medication you may need during the flight.

In case of an emergency, leave your carry-on baggage securely stowed and follow the crew's instructions.

How to Keep Your Carry-On Safe

To avoid security alerts, do not leave your baggage unattended in or around airport terminals. Using a lock on your carry-on bag is an effective deterrent against theft.

Checked Baggage

Weight, Size, and Quantity

Each suitcase must weigh less than 23 kg (50 lbs). This is an international standard designed to protect airport workers who handle hundreds of bags each day. If your bag exceeds this weight, you may be asked to repack or it may be labeled as "heavy baggage."

The "piece concept" is generally used for flights to, from, and within Canada and the United States. This concept defines the number of bags allowed by the passenger's ticket. Under this system, passengers are typically allowed two checked bags, each weighing up to 32 kg (70 lbs), with maximum dimensions of 158 cm (62 inches) (sum of height + width + length).

Identification

Baggage is often lost due to detached tags. To ensure your baggage can be identified in any situation, attach a label with your name, phone number, and email address on the exterior of your bag. A copy of your travel itinerary must be placed inside your luggage.

If the airline is unable to identify your baggage by other means, it may need to be opened. Your internal identification will be essential for the recovery of your belongings.

Valuables

We recommend that you do not pack valuable items in your checked baggage.

What Not to Pack in Checked Baggage

We strongly recommend that all portable electronic devices be placed in your carry-on baggage. If you must place them in checked baggage, ensure they are completely powered off and not in sleep or hibernation mode.

E-cigarettes/vapes, spare batteries, and portable power banks are strictly prohibited in checked baggage.

Certain items—including gas canisters, lighters, fireworks, bleach, and similar substances—are not allowed in checked baggage.

If you are unsure whether an item is permitted, please contact your airline. Items deemed too dangerous for transport in checked baggage will be removed and likely not returned.



Explosives, flammable items, sharp objects, toxic or infectious substances, radioactive materials and corrosive materials are strictly prohibited on our flights.
